Dear friends,

We are pleased to share our 2022 annual report, our first-ever formally produced recap! Despite the challenges that face Colorado youth as they emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, we're excited to report positive signs thanks to your support.

Rise Above Colorado is a statewide prevention organization that measurably impacts teen perceptions and attitudes about the risks of substance misuse to empower youth to make positive choices for their future. Rise Above Colorado collaborates with teens, educators, community leaders, and prevention partners to provide credible, teen-centered data using the evidence-based Science of the Positive framework to correct misperceptions about substance use.

Throughout this report, you'll find a balance of sobering data about the impact of substance use and addiction on teens' mental health and behaviors, as well as highlights of the various ways Rise Above Colorado is providing youth with information, resources, and activities to support healthy choices.

In our work we're always balancing hope and concern. We don't sugarcoat the impact of substances on the teenage brain, body, and relationships, but we also celebrate all the positive choices that Colorado youth make every day. During the last five years, we've been educating Colorado teens about the data that MOST youth are NOT using drugs and alcohol. In doing so we're working to debunk the "everybody's doing it" mentality and we're seeing progress. Based on data from our 2022 Rise Above Colorado Youth Survey, we saw significant declines in the number of middle and high-school-aged youth overestimating peer use of marijuana and vaping products. The more accurate youth perceptions are, the more likely they are to join the majority of their peers in choosing not to use substances.

While that's encouraging news, we know there's more we can do to support young people in making positive choices. In addition, we're actively responding to new threats to our young people, namely the fentanyl epidemic. We'll be excited to share these resources with you as the year progresses as we work to raise awareness and share ways that Coloradans of all ages can take action to reduce fentanyl's toll.

We couldn't do this work without you. Whether you're a donor, community partner or a young person leading the way, we're grateful for your belief in our organization and a better future for Colorado youth.




Rise Above Colorado Youth Survey

With funding support from a federal grant managed by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's Community Prevention and Early Intervention unit, we commissioned an assessment from March to May 2022 among teenagers across Colorado with HealthCare Research, Inc. to understand their attitudes and behaviors surrounding substance use. We have administered this survey regularly since 2009. All data collection in 2022 was completed online, gathering 718 interviews from online panels and social media recruitment.

Our 2022 survey had an increased focus on understanding attitudes and use of specific prescription drugs, specifically about stimulants, anti-anxiety medications and pain relievers such as fentanyl. You will see infographics from the survey results throughout this report.



In 2022, we received an increase in requests for presentations in schools of our Not Prescribed prescription drug prevention resource as well as training for adults who work with youth. The infographics above reflect the increased concern about this issue, but we are also worked hard in 2022 to increase hope in the effectiveness of prevention. **A few accomplishments we're proud of:**



Positive Community Norming


Our 2022 RAC Youth Survey results reinforced our core belief: that the vast majority of youth are NOT misusing substances and ARE making positive choices daily.

Teen Action Councils

Across our two Teen Action Councils, **24 teens** from all over Colorado come together to learn about substance misuse prevention, build important life skills, and empower their peers to make healthy connections, decisions, and change. 15 of these teens served on our statewide Teen Action Council representing communities across Colorado and 9 served on the Denver Teen Action Council, representing 7 schools, in partnership with Denver Public Schools and Denver Health.



These young leaders represented Rise Above Colorado in the media and at public events and lent their expertise to inform many of our programs and resources. We're proud of the ways they have supported each other as they have navigated the past few difficult years. The infographics below illustrate just how much parents and youth across Colorado have been struggling.

Household use is up significantly

Four out of ten teens live with someone misusing substances

41% of teens report they are living with someone who has a substance use disorder or is addicted to alcohol or drugs (**up from 25% in 2020**)

Female teens are more impacted

47%, more than twice the rate reported in 2020 (up from 22%)

Teen use is more likely when living with an adult with a substance use disorder

Teens living in these situations are **at least 2x as likely** to have misused substances in the past 30 days



Mental health adds to challenges

Nearly half of teens report living with someone with mental health concerns



4 out of 10 teens who report living with someone with a mental health concern have at least 6 or more challenging mental health days a month


Recent substance use increased among teens who live with someone who is struggling, with a significant increase in marijuana usage





Constellation Project Partnerships

Our Colorado Constellation Project provides a network of youth and adults across the state to implement substance misuse prevention efforts in a meaningful way. Our partners co-create campaign messaging, educational resources, and community learning opportunities to shape environments that support youth and prevent substance misuse. We were grateful to bring on two new Constellation Partners in 2022: Jefferson County Communities That Care and Broomfield Youth for Youth Communities That Care. Both communities have impressive youth engagement efforts and have already brought incredible energy to this work!



Positive Community Norming Cohort

We have **seven partners** across the state who work with us on our "^H Positive Community Norming (PCN) Efforts to correct youth misperceptions about substance use, **bolded in the list below.**

In our statewide RAC Youth Survey, we were excited and impressed to see that more youth in our PCN partner communities think there is a great risk in using marijuana on a regular basis compared to other youth in Colorado.

Endowment Fund


